In 2016, supporters helped AWET raise a record £500,000 for the poor, widows and orphans.

Your support helped provide:

- Medical Camps reaching out to over 5,000 families
- · Water facilities reaching out to over 30 villages
- · School Dinners for more than 1500 children daily
- 50 Weddings
- Food Distribution to more than 10,000 families & 200 Schools
- Widows Farming support to 68 widows and farmed 47 acres of land
- Widows House building 20 constructed and 50 ongoing
- Ladies awareness programs and education scholarships
- Education sponsorships for more than 200 needy and orphan children

AWET aims and objectives include the tackling of poverty, disease and hunger in rural Western Kenya, approximately 3,500 sq. miles and a population of over 5 million of which 1.5 million are Muslims.

Rural poverty in Kenya is strongly linked to environmental concerns – especially poor water management, declining soil fertility, land degradation and difficulty in maintaining livestock. Severe drought occurred in 2010 and 2011, with 4 million people requiring food assistance and this has been repeated in 2016 and 2017 with more than 5 million requiring food assistance.


AWET plan to extend their food distribution, widow support and orphan support in 2017, with a drive to provide necessary basic food and provision of water to ease the strain of the famine. Despite the difficult environment we shall persist with income generation programs such as farming and extend our Artisan program and College & University Sponsorships.

Orphans

We support hundreds of orphans and needy children in dire conditions, living with single guardians e.g. grandparents, uncles and aunts as well as single parents. Support generally is made up of clothes, food, medicine, school fees etc.

Indifferent rains in 2016 and 2017 has led to many dry wells, failed crops and loss of livestock. The famine in Africa in general has been caused by the lack of rain and augmented by rising food prices due to relying on imported foods. Many wells have to be re-bored at twice the previous depth.

Clean water not only saves lives through the provision of safe drinking water, but also has a much wider impact including sanitation, growing food and sustaining livestock.


Water tanks are used to collect rainwater and used for washing, ablutions and farming.




School Meals & Education

What is seen as normal for our children is but a dream for school children in western Kenya. The ill fitting uniforms is just something we can see but the reality is much harsher. For most school children breakfast and lunch is non-existent.

One meal a day at home usually consists of only maize and some sugar cane. This is the staple diet of the Kenyan youth. Vegetables and protein is not part of the main diet and is not seen in the villages of western Kenya.

Angel Welfare & Education Trust provide porridge for 1200 students across three schools on a daily basis throughout the school year.







Widows

Widows naturally find it difficult to financially support themselves. We can bring comfort to their lives through the provision of food and basic needs.

In addition to food rations, wherever possible we provide seed and fertiliser to cultivate their family land. If necessary we organise labourers to help the widows to sow and gather the crops. The widows farming project helps them become more self-sufficient by generating basic foods and a household income.







Midows House

Houses for Widows has been a success in many villages leading to increase in self-esteem brought about by a better and healthier living.

We intend to double the construction teams to build as many houses as possible.













O Medical & Jiggers Camp

In a land where water and food is a concern medical needs are neglected leading to deteriorating situation of illness and lack of income. Malaria is still the largest killer in Kenya. Jigger infestation is another misery for many Kenyans.

Our medical camp tends to run for a month treating over 5,000 men, women and children. Facilitated by doctors, nurses and pharmacists.







A natural self- sustenance project which has worked well for many farmers. We provide seed and fertiliser for Farmers at a cost of £75 which generates annual income ranging between £400 and £1,000.








65 Masjids Built

Educating and supporting children, ladies as well as men. The Imaam provides relevant information of locals needs and aids in the provision of support to relieve those needs.










Lavatory Project

In Western Kenya the need for lavatories is very apparent. We have seen schools with over 500 children sharing just two lavatories. Having to wait in long queues inevitably leads to education being compromised.

We live in a world of convenience where the next travel stop will always have decent arrangements for relief. In the rural areas of Kenya it is either a queue for a lavatory or a bush, even at school, market areas or other places where we expect facilities to be sufficient.

Lavatories are built in blocks of two with a lifespan of approximately 15-20 years. The foundation and walls are made of concrete and plaster, and the roof is of tin sheets. The hygiene tank which serves both lavatories is non-reversible which lasts for 15-20 years. The tank is designed to eliminate odours utilising chemicals and maskers which neutralise foul odours. The non-reversible entry system aids hygiene by preventing incidents or accidents.
